The enormous group of nearly 60 students, accompanied by their history professors, Dr. Louiza Rodrigues and Maithili Ma'am, left for Jaipur by train on the evening of the 28th October. Having arrived at their destination on the afternoon of the 29th after a thrilling train journey, the group visited the architecturally monumental Albert Museum, which houses a splendid collection of swords, shields, guns, armour, sculptures, porcelain – the list is endless! The visit to the intriguing museum was further followed by the trip to Chokhi Dhani – the ultimate destination for the seekers of authentic Indian rural life! That's where the students were introduced to the lively and mesmerizing world of rural artistes showcasing their wonderful talents. Students also recollect that the traditional (and gigantic!) Rajasthani Thali served to them there is surely a hearty meal worth remembering forever!

BRACE YOURSELF WINTER IS COMING

What to expect from this year's Winter Session of the Parliament:

The Winter Sessions of the Parliament are, more often than not, interesting affairs. Last year, the winter session, consisting of 22 sittings, passed 12 Bills in total of the 17 proposed. By the end of last year's session, 66 Bills were pending while 6 were withdrawn. If I seem to be delving directly into statistics, well that's because I am, for statistics is important to when it comes to sessions of the Parliament. It gives us an idea of how much work gets done in these sessions, and Winter Sessions are especially animated, considering that they come right before the Budget sessions.

The dates of this year's Winter Session are yet to be decided, and they would reportedly be decided once the Bihar polls are done with. However, reports have already indicated what could be expected from the session, the most significant of which could be the GST Bill, which amends the Constitution to introduce goods and services tax. Other notable Bills which the Center might try to impose upon the Oppo-

sition this year include the land bill, the real estate regulation and development bill and the negotiable instruments arbitration bill.

Meanwhile, the Labor Ministry aims to table nine bills this year, with the intention of "protecting the workers' rights." That, however, can be contested, considering that the government's policies do not, in fact, give much weight to manual labor or the worker. The Payment of Bonus (Amendment) Bill, already approved by the Cabinet, is an important Bill, and so is Small Factories (Regulation of Employment and Condition of Services) Bill, for they ensure the right of the worker over his/her work, ensuring also that the employer does not wield more than the necessary amount of power.

One can of course expect a lot of discussion, debate and animated conversation when it comes to the month-long Winter session, but if all goes well, the Center can very well turn this year's session into a crowning **glory for themselves.**

Romila Thapar's Lecture on Secularism.

In an attempt to imagine a future without secularism in the country, Romila Thapar questions the basic understanding of the term. Popularly used in political arena, Thapar says that 'secularism' is in fact beyond politics, however characterized by the political forces. Secularism is the basic fabric of a democracy, without which democracy will become a "victim".

The Third Indo-African Summit

The Third Indo-African Forum summit was held from 26-30 October in New Delhi. The motto of the summit was to increase dialogue between the continent and India. It also aimed at increasing bilateral trade and other issues. The summit was attended by representatives from 54 countries and by Head of the State or Head of Governments of 41 countries. African leaders discussed wide range of issues with Prime Minister Narendra Modi at the summit. They asked for aid from India to fight against various terrorist groups in the continent. Along with this, they invited more investment from public and private sector of India.

On the other hand, African continent is important for India, primarily because of it is rich in natural resources and minerals. India requires those minerals to meet the increasing demands of its domestic market. Africa is rich in Gold, Silver, Oil, Diamond, etc. The previous two Indo-African summit were attended by representatives of mere 10-15 countries, but this time it was attended by representatives of 54 countries including head of the State of South Africa and Egypt. Prime Minister offered a concessional credit of \$10 billion over the next five years. This will be in addition to the ongoing credit programme.

PM also offered a grant assistance of \$600 million dollars. It includes \$100 million Indo-African development fund and \$10 million Indo-Africa Health Fund. It also includes 50,000 scholarships in India over a period of next five years. India is aiding Africa in building various infrastructure facilities, public transport, clean energy, irrigation, manufacturing capacity and agriculture. PM described India and Africa as BRIGHT SPOTS OF HOPE AND ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES. Indo-African summits will now be held after every five years instead of three.

Simply put Returning of Awards

When did it all start?

It all started in early September when Hindi writer Uday Prakash returned the Sahitya Akademi award. It was a protest against the Akademi's indifference over the murder of intellectuals such as M. Kalburgi.

Who was M. Kalburgi?

Malleshappa Kalburgi was a prominent atheist scholar who had angered the conservative Hindus with his criticism of idol worship and religion. He was murdered by some hard-line Hindu fundamentalist groups on 30th August, 2015. He was also a previous winner of Sahitya Akademi Award.

How did this proceed?

The other Sahitya Akademi winners returned their awards as they were angered by the fact that the academy did not speak anything on M. Kalburgi's fate.

Which incident further aggravated this?

These protests were paced after the murder of a Muslim villager by a mob of Hindus on 30th September. There were rumors that he had stored beef in his fridge which were later proven to be false.

Who else did join this?

Poets, authors, playwrights also joined hands in this protest, expressing solidarity to the FTII students as well.

What is the FTII row?

FTII stands for Film and Television Institute of India. The students went on an indefinite strike since June 12 for opposing the appointment of TV actor Gajendra Chauhan as the Chairman of the institute and 4 other political appointees.

What is the current scenario?

The students ended their 140-day old strike but would continue to protest and resist current appointments in whichever peaceful ways possible.

How has the protest been taken forward?

12 filmmakers announced that they would return their National Awards as a mark of protest against the rising intolerance in the country.

Attracted by the variety of culture and traditions across the country, not only Indians but a lot of International tourists wander in India. Heritage tourism is another element that could be the most significant segment within the next few years. Being the land of spirituality, pilgrimage tourism is also a noticeable segment of Indian tourism. But the feather in the cap is medical tourism. As the treatment costs for many an ill are considerably low in India compared to Western countries, the medical tourism is the thing to be looked forward to. And add to that the various Ayurveda spas, detox and treatment centers which are also great attractions on their own. The industry also supports our rich culture and heritage, by allowing area-specific cottage and handicraft industries to flourish and providing employment to local artists and workmen.

The impact of tourism Industry on Indian employment is phenomenal. 7.7% of the total job opportunities in India were provided by tourism. By 2023, at least 31 million people would be employed by the industry according to research. Further, the latest campaign announced by our PM the 'Ek Bharat, Shreshtha Bharat' is expected to boost inter-state tourism to greater levels.

The job opportunities in this industry primarily depends on-attracting, accommodating and entertaining tourists. Thus, there are a number of jobs available in airlines, cruises, travel companies, hotels, resorts, restaurants and event management.

The following gives you an insight into the prerequisites before stepping into the blooming tourism industry. A career in tourism has got tons of prospects, with the condition that one pursues a bachelor's degree or a master's degree in courses like travel and tourism management, hospitality management, international tourism diploma, diploma in tourism planning etc. While travel clerks need to have a high school diploma or its equivalent, as well as on-the-job training provided by the employer. Tour guides may require only a high school diploma but it is preferable if they have a bachelor's degree as well. An international travel agent requires a good deal of specialized knowledge about a variety of travel destinations. Aspiring travel agents should have at least a bachelor's degree. Some universities offer a Bachelor of Science (BS) in Hospitality. Students may choose to pursue a degree in marketing while focusing on tourism management. Foreign language skills are extremely helpful for international tourism managers. Undergraduate-level programs typically include courses in communications, business mathematics, economics, history, political science, social and behavioral sciences and ethics. Programs may also include courses in laws related to tourism. Hotel managers and tourism marketing managers often have an MBA in tourism management or in a hospitality-related field. Apart from this, one can even find planning and research related jobs in travel companies. To go ahead for an adventurous career in the ever-expanding tourism industry one may consider the following recommended Indian institutes to pursue the required degrees-

- 1) **Indian Institute of Tourism and Travel Management (Gwalior, Bhubaneswar, Noida, Goa, Nellore)**
- 2) **UEI Global (Pune, New Delhi, Chennai, Agra, Jaipur)**
- 3) **International Institute of Hotel Management, New Delhi**
- 4) **ITM Institute of Hotel Management**

The geographical, cultural and natural diversity along with improving infrastructure, changing lifestyles and supportive governmental policies, the tourism industry would have a lot of posts to be taken.

Tourism being an integral part of Indian economy and expected to grow at nearly 8%, it would surely be a jackpot of employment opportunities in the **next decade.**

मग माणूस मेला तरी त्याचं माणूसपण जिवंत राहिल, त्याने पेरून ठेवलेल्या माणुसकीत.

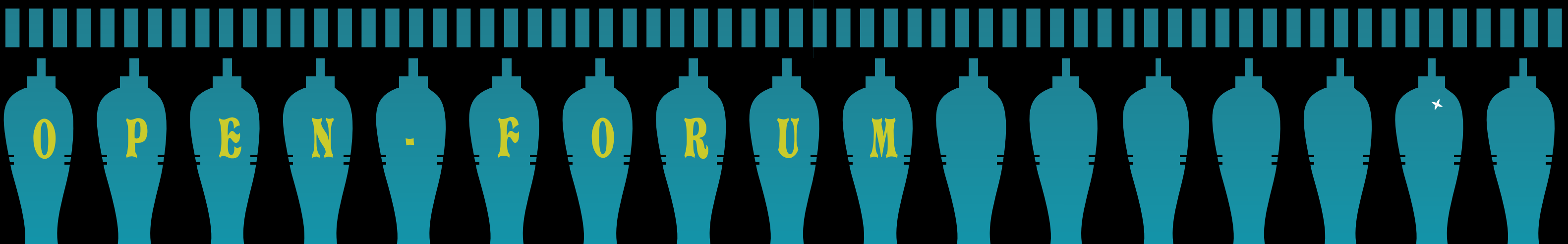
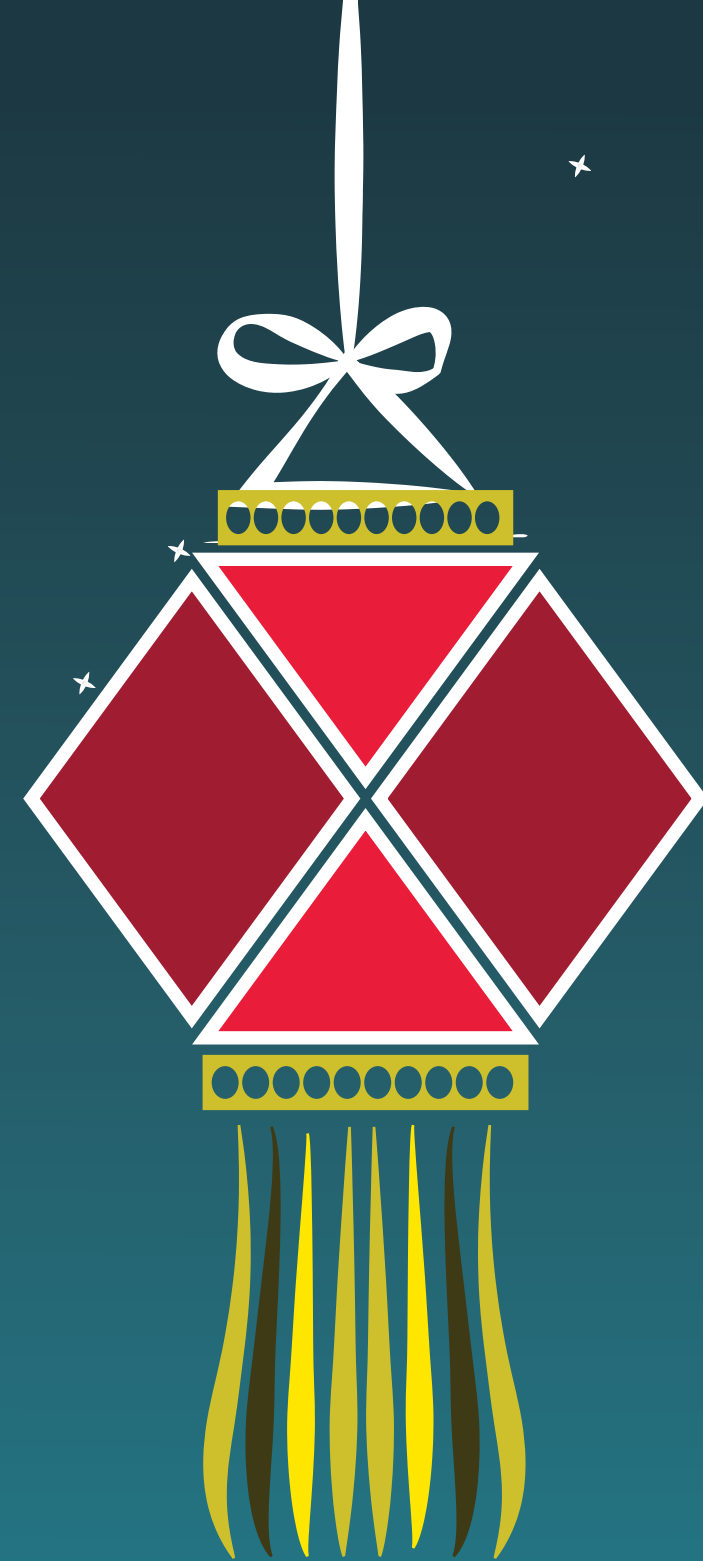
Diwali 'The Special Bonanza Offers' Festival'

A GRADATION IN GREY

Whether it is our aesthetically pleasurable and indulgent Hindu mythology or any other 'story' one hears as a child, they are all painted with black and white depictions. It's the good v/s the bad, the greedy v/s the humble, the righteous v/s the evil. Look at the Barbie films that one saw as a kid. There's an extremely wicked witch and then there's angelic Barbie.

The very basis of Hindu religion pits the devas against the asuras.

Consider the two renowned and evergreen epics from Hindu mythology: The Ramayana and The Mahabharata.

The stark point of basic consideration that we cover in summarising these beautiful texts are somewhat on the terms: Ramayana is Rama (the good) v/s Ravana (the evil) and Mahabharata is Kauravas (the evil) v/s Pandavas (the good). But is that it? Do the character depictions end at that? Classifying the righteous and unrighteous?

This is where we hit the focal point of my write-up. The world isn't a black and white phenomenon as we make it be. We're all grey. A mixture. The different shades in its gradation.

We have our annoyances and turbulent moods just as we have our generosity and altruism.

Why do we never talk about how courageous and brave-hearted Duryodhan was, putting aside his follies for a moment? Or how stubborn even the philosophical and moral Yudhisthir could be? Isn't that one of the main reasons why Game Of Thrones is such a popular series today, where no one is polarized as extremely good and bad?

Beats by Mr.Dove

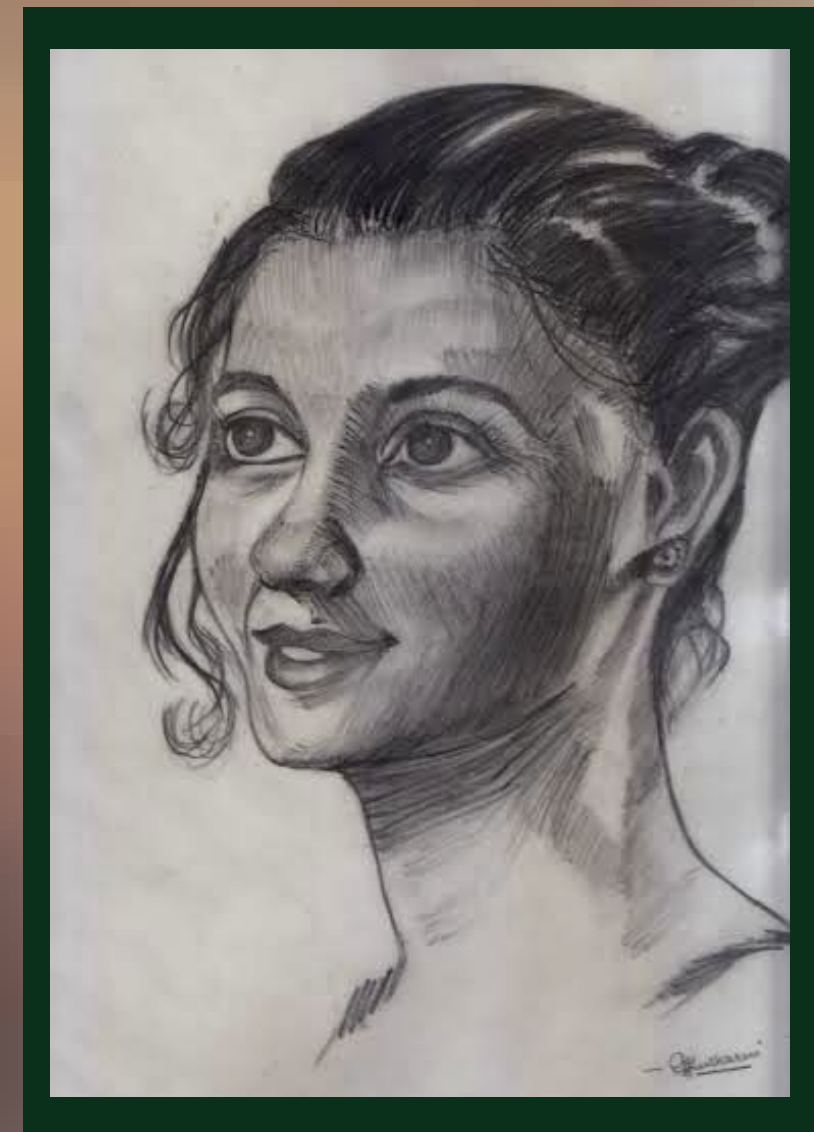
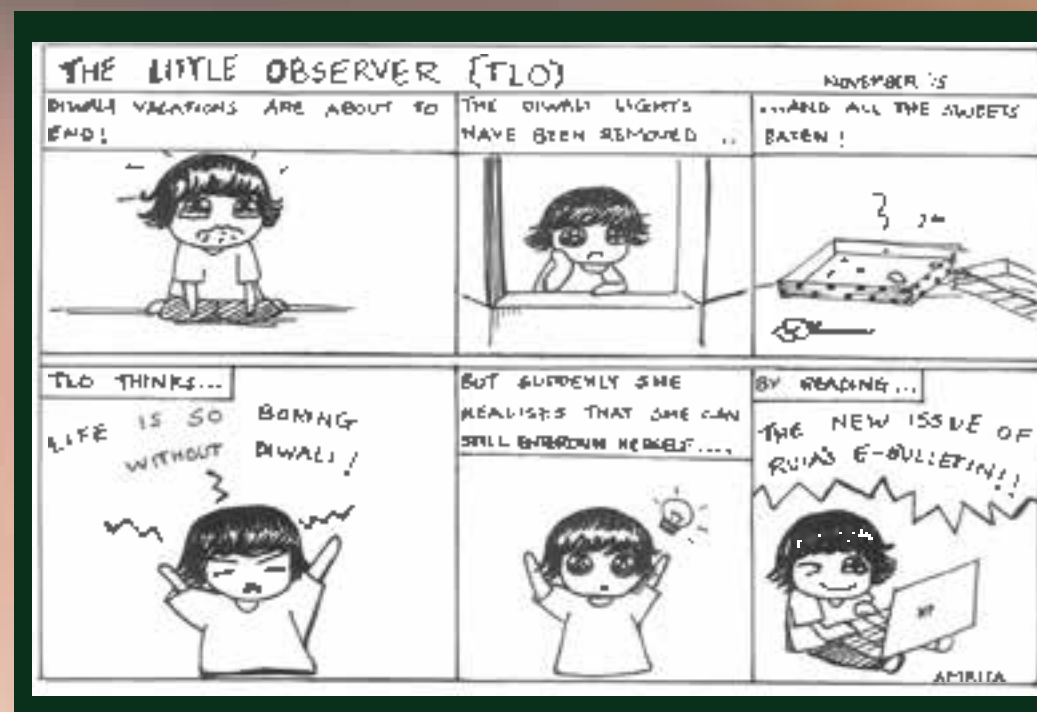
