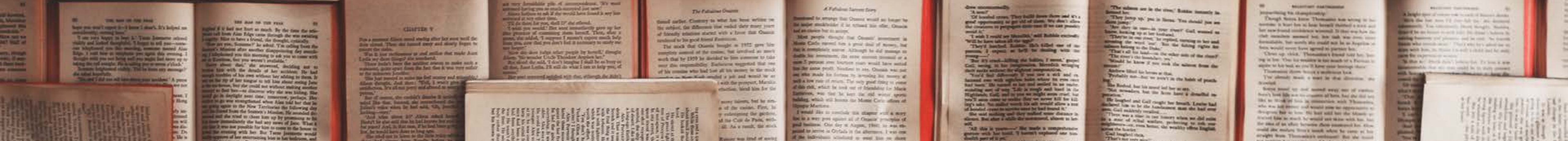

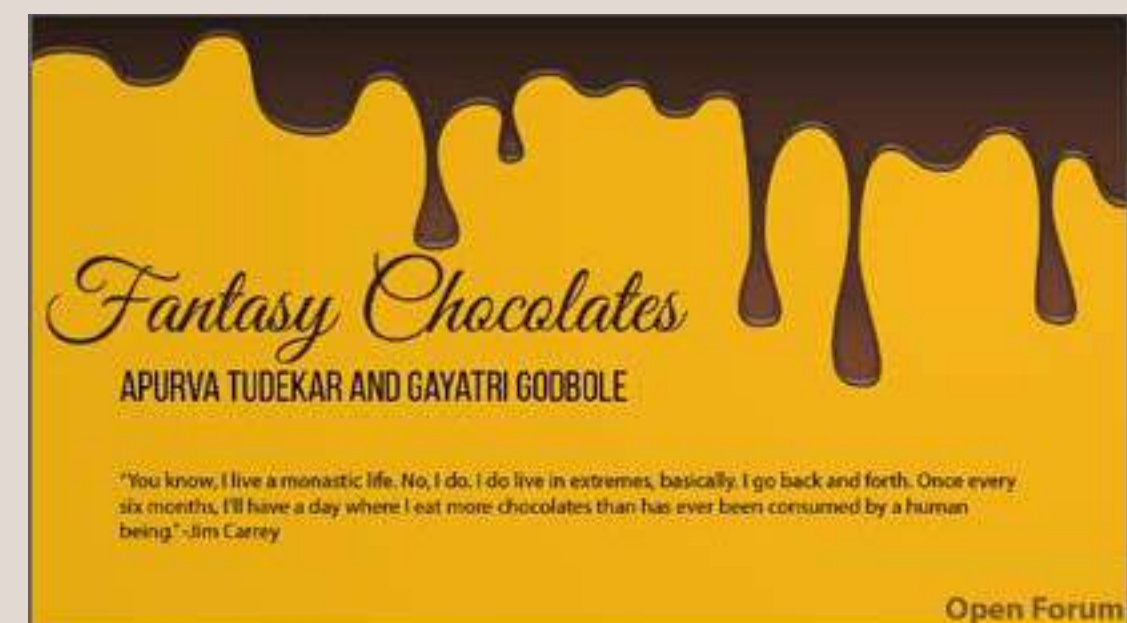

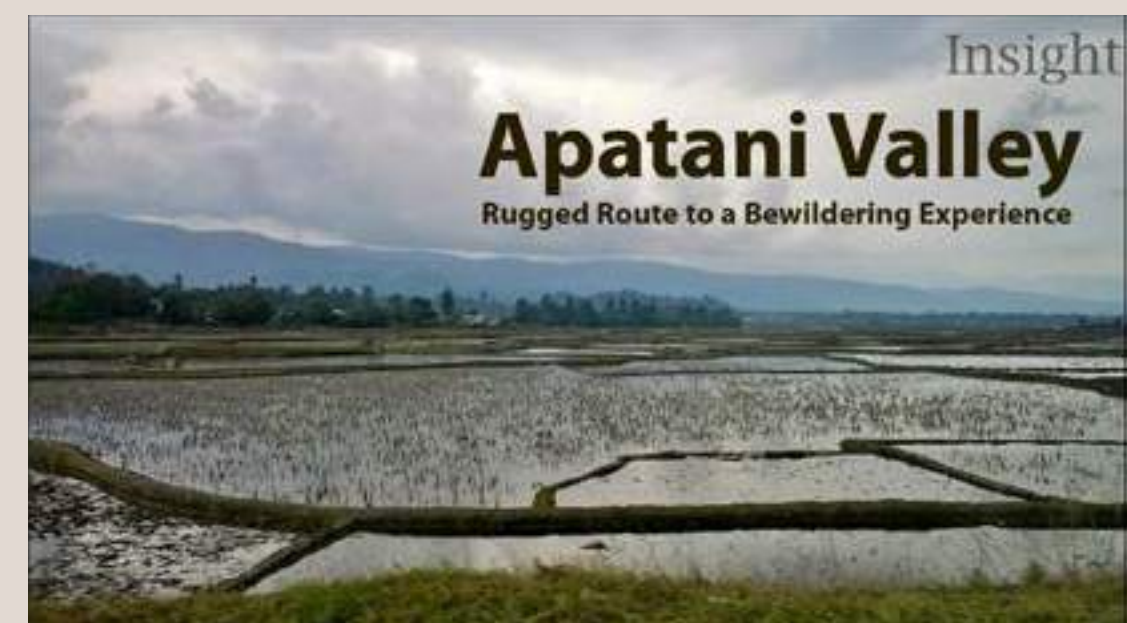

# Media Trials - Are We Being Misled?

**Media** - one of the greatest weapons of the common man to fight injustice! But what does the common man do when this weapon betrays its purpose? Media touches all facets of our life - social, economic, psychological and political. That's why its existence is inevitably important. Media's aim is to transfer correct information, to carry people's grievances to their representatives, and to collect and report information about the happenings of the world. But what happens when media goes a little overboard while doing its duty and starts influencing people's minds? This becomes a very dangerous aspect in a democracy like India where governance is indirectly in the hands of the people. We have got into the habit of believing what the media says because of the original duty that it did - providing information. But the majority of us have failed to notice that now, media is not only providing information but also judging the same information and passing public verdicts on it, the same thing we now know as Trial by Media. What exactly happens in these kinds of trials is

that media passes a verdict on a case and defines what is right and wrong, almost performing the duty of the Judiciary. In some cases like the Jessica Lal murder case, there is no doubt that media had become the common man's saviour and in Sabrina Lal's (Jessica's sister) words 'got us justice', but on the contrary, we have major controversial instances like the arrest of JNUSU president Kanhaiya Kumar on the basis of a tape provided by a certain news channel which was later found out to be a doctored tape.

The thing here is that, because of the mammoth competition that exists in the world of media, news providers resort to all kinds of means to gain TRPs even if it means tampering with important information or passing judgemental views on people and events and stating what is right or wrong. The media is the fourth pillar of democracy and its job is solely to provide information and pressurise the government when necessary, by voicing people's grievances, but it seems like it has also started to do the job of passing verdicts by being blind

to the fact that there is a separate judiciary system present for that very job. Trial by media seems unnecessary as it only raises conflicts in the minds of the people and creates an illusion of truth in the common man's already clouded mind. Ultimately, irrelevant of its advantages and disadvantages, a 'trial' is something the media should not do. It should stick to its job of providing correct knowledge. Media can make or break a person because media is something that, even if criticised by the people, gains their keen attention, and a democracy like India needs its fourth pillar - media - to stand upright. So the things that would happen if media deterred from its duties are not unimaginable anymore since one can witness them these days. The common man should leave verdicts for the judiciary and let his opinions rely on his own common sense.

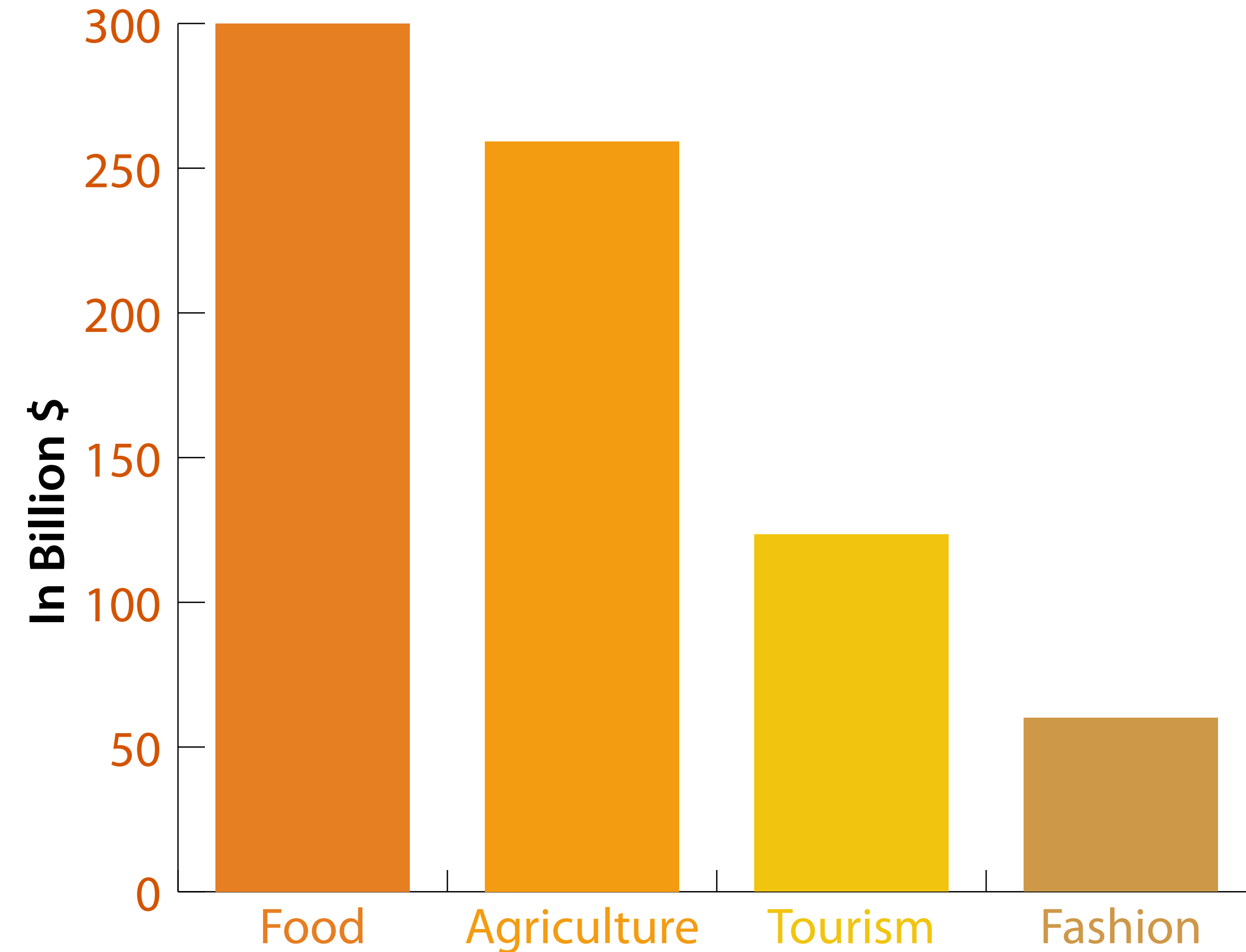

# Salaries/Remuneration- (2014-2015)

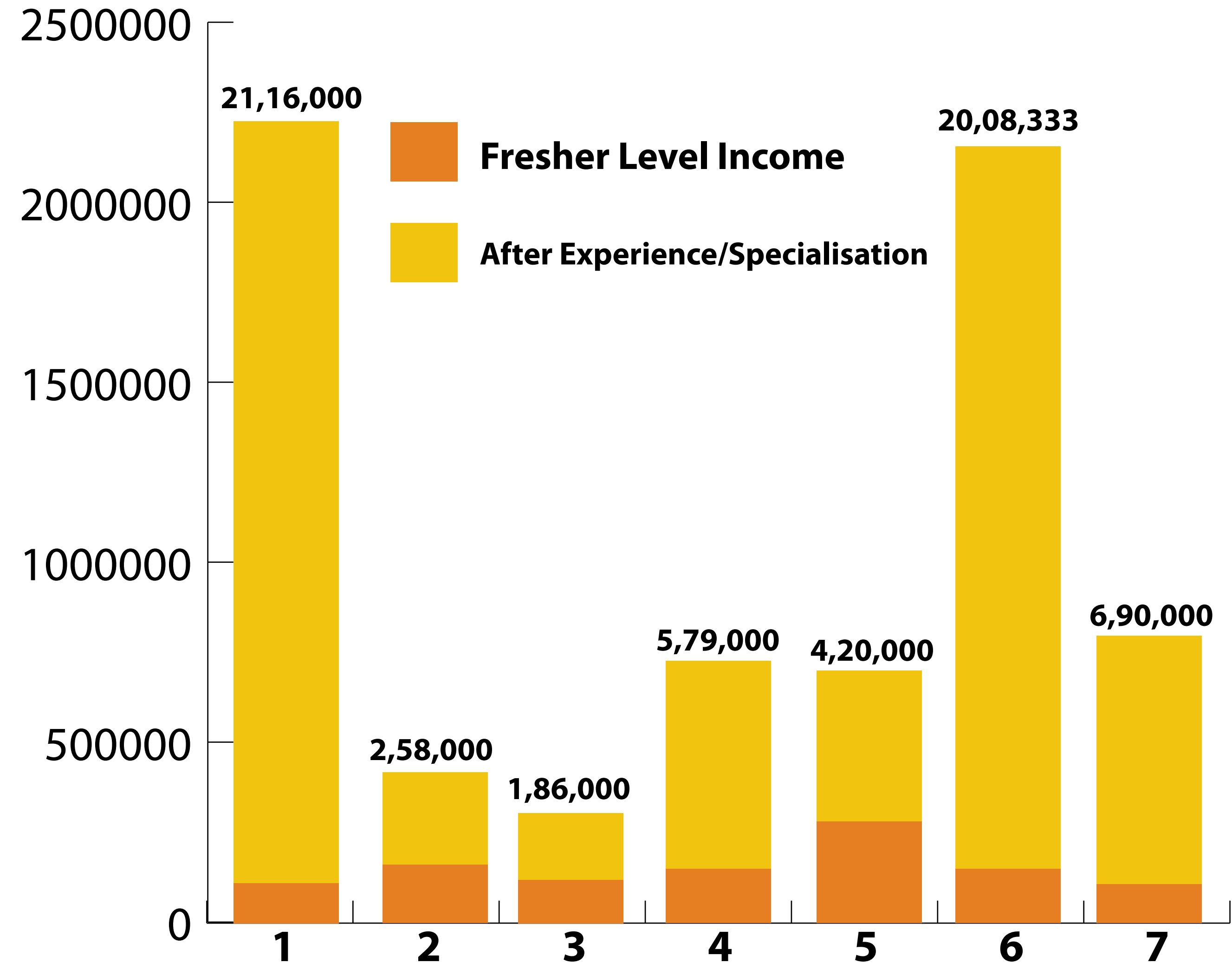

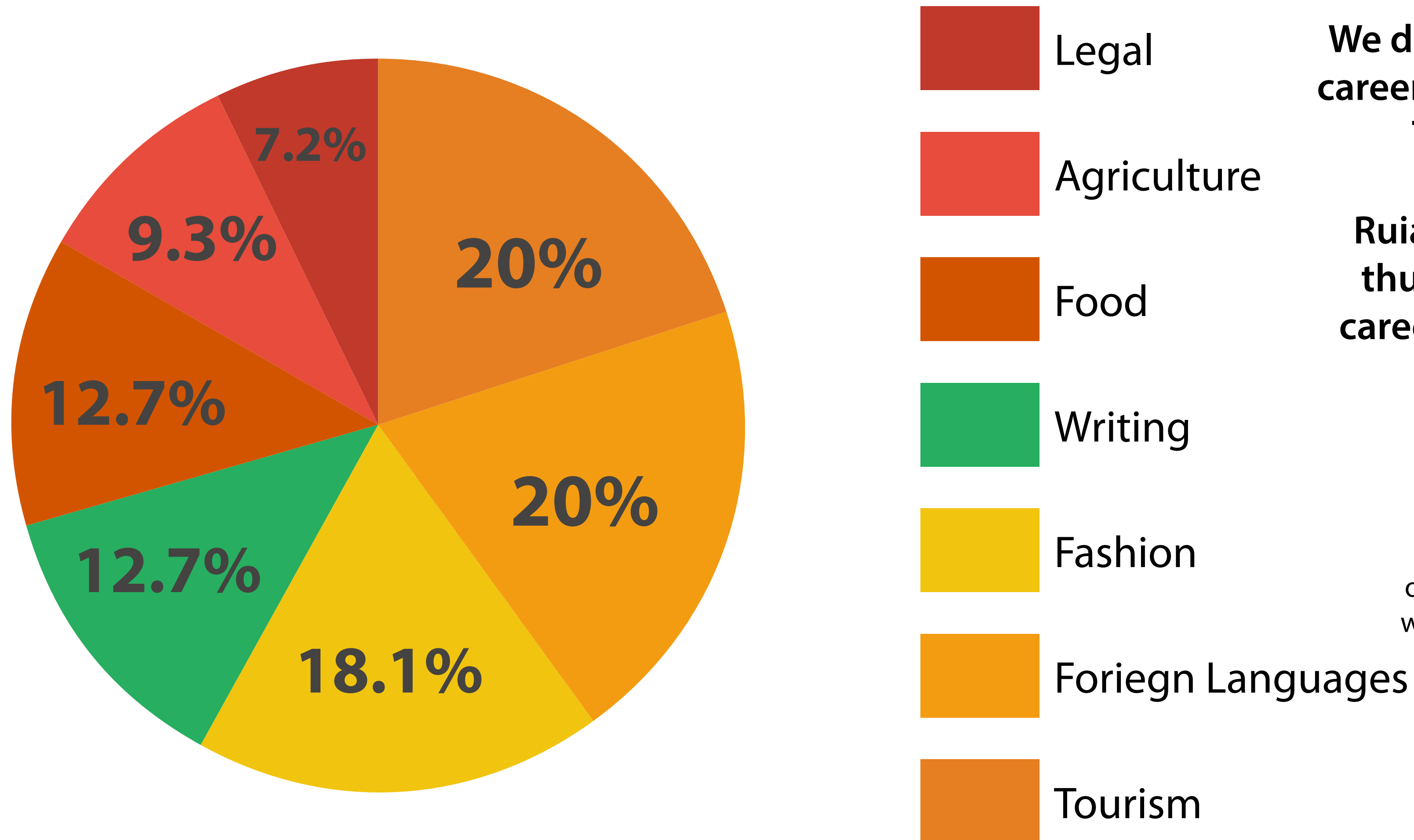

# CAREER PREFERENCES OF RUIAITES



We decided to ask 55 of our readers about their career preferences from all our featured careers. The results were surprising, yet beautifully insightful about the career preferences of Ruiaites! That no particular career group got a thumping majority, proves that almost all the careers were indeed, unique in their own right.

As high as 20% of the 55 students were interested in the careers that the tourism industry offers. Another 20% preferred careers with foreign languages. Fashion careers came a close second with 18.1%. The third place was occupied by writing careers and careers in the food industry, with 12.7% each. Agriculture and nature related careers were the second least- preferred careers at 9.09% and legal careers, astonishingly, were the least preferred with only 7.2% opting for them.

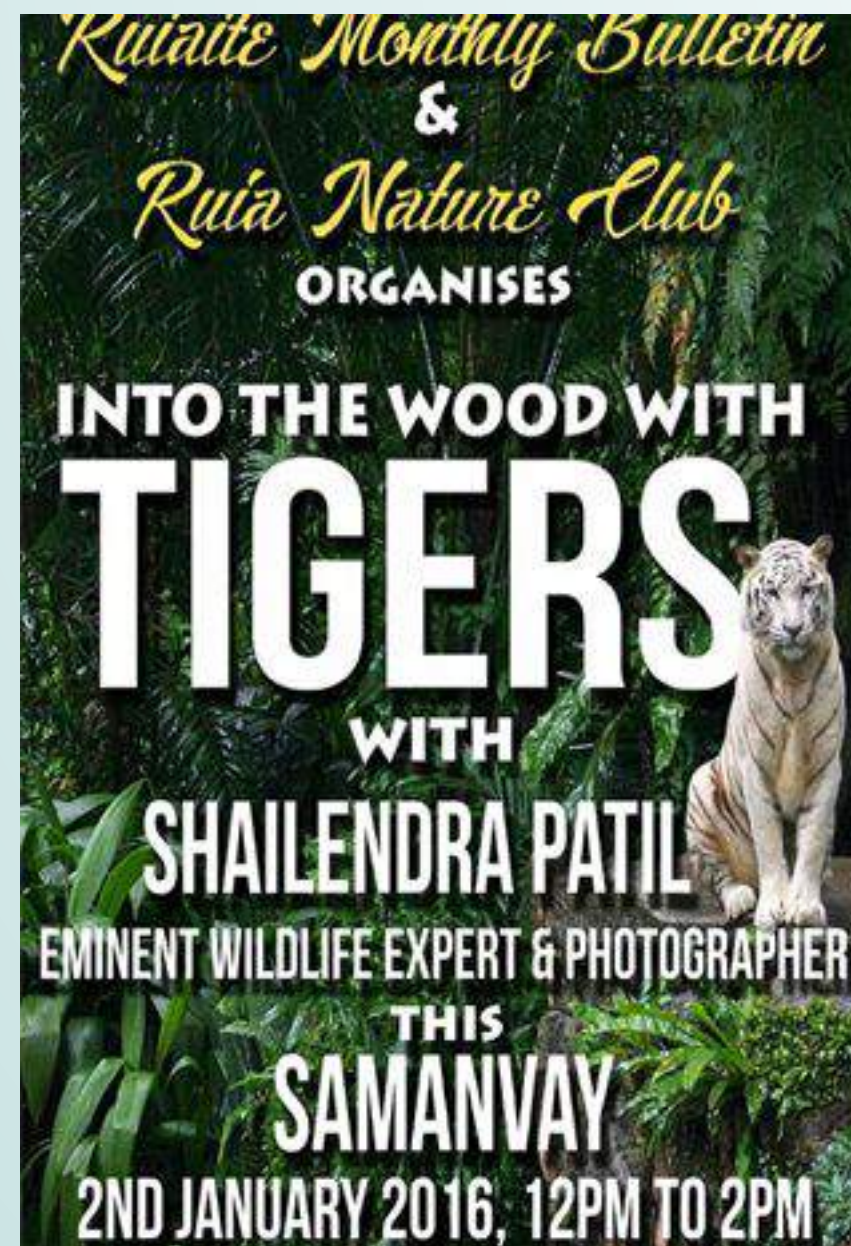

Cool breeze, rustling of leaves, enchanting fragrance of flowers, soothing shade of a lush green Banyan tree and nourishing sunshine.....

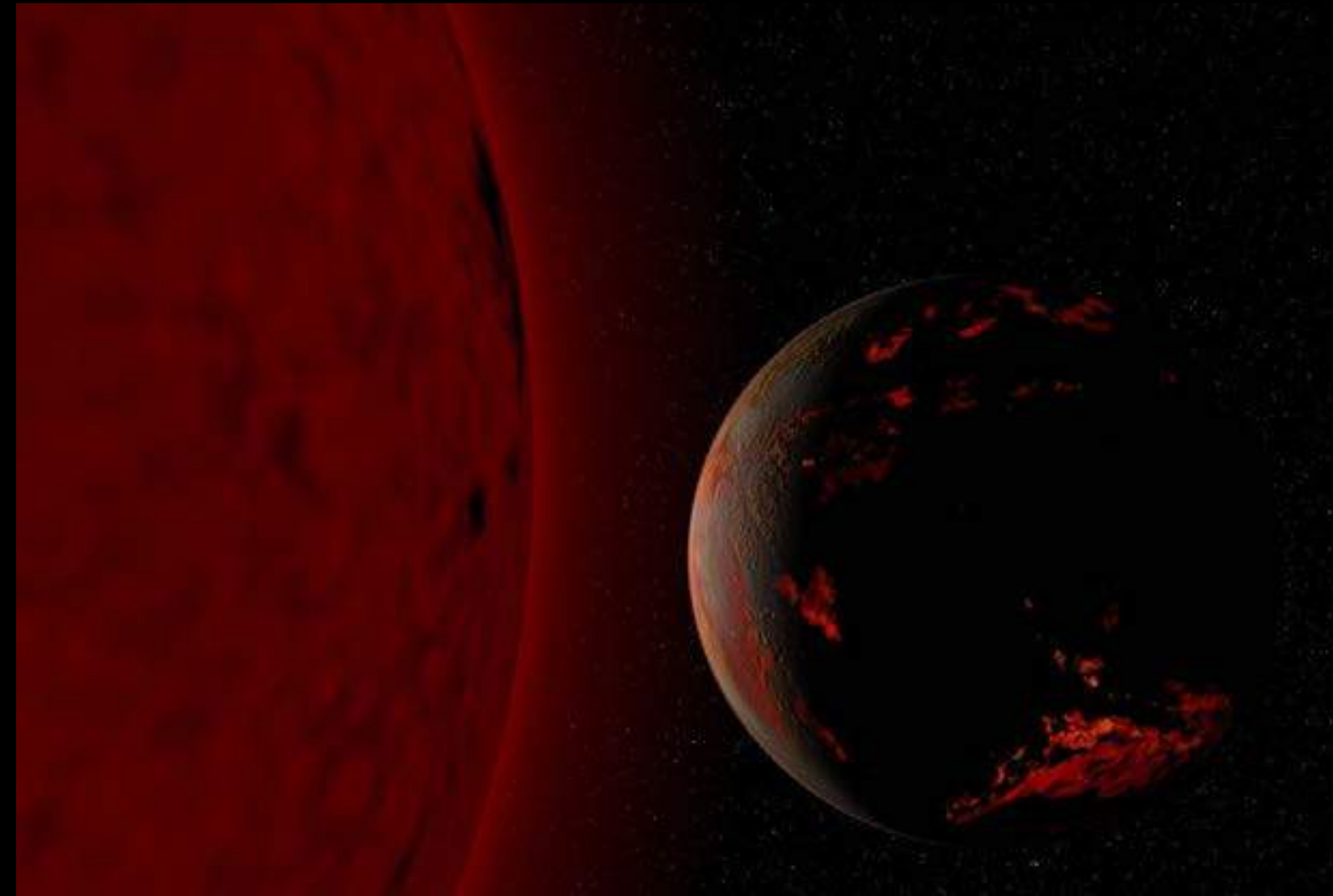
What is it that comes to our mind?

The unparalleled grandeur of our planet fascinates us! Since the dawn of civilization, humans have revered and worshipped our home as a Mother who produces and sustains life. The advent of life itself on this planet has engulfed many intellectuals into the tedious task of unraveling its deeper mysterious dimensions. I believe, one of the epoch-making contributions that were made in that direction came from Charles Darwin, who in his path-breaking work, 'Origin of Species' demonstrated how life must have originated on the planet. Asteroid impact, Extraterrestrial invasion, cosmic threats, geomagnetic reversal, global pandemic, megatsunami and volcanism constitute events that are out of human control.

Now if we know the risks....the question remains that what do we do about it? Certainly! There are many steps that we can take to infuse optimism and make people believe that we can live enthusiastic and fulfilling lives. But I believe we don't have a choice not to do anything about this. NASA has developed an app which calculates our daily contribution towards carbon footprint. The app suggests ways and means to reduce our footprint gradually but consistently. Greater use of LED bulbs and LED technology is also helpful. Planting more and more saplings and ensuring that they grow is the least that everyone must do as an obligation. It is high time, I believe, that we decide what is important and tread the path accordingly! Thank you!

# Apatani Valley

Rugged Route to a Bewildering Experience

**My memories** go back 4 years to the month of April 2012, when I was to start my research and had decided that Ziro (a quaint village) in Arunachal Pradesh would be my destination for the same. My most erudite circle of friends and family was astonished and bewildered by my choice to such an extent that I was asked if I had a passport to visit this unknown place.

Firstly, Ziro is a beautiful valley situated in the lower Subansari district in Arunachal Pradesh - the land of the rising sun. It is home to a small, yet educationally the most advanced Arunachal Tribe called Apatani. Ziro has been nominated as a World Heritage Site by UNESCO for its pristine beauty as well as for the unique form of agriculture that is practiced by the Apatanis, which serves as a sustainable model of ecological preservation.

The village gets its name through ancient Apatani mythological stories, in which people of a tribe named Ziro were the original inhabitants of this land and the Apatanis migrated to this territory from Tibet during the 6th century, when they

were forced to practice Buddhism instead of their own tribal faith. Even today, the Apatanis are one of the very few tribes of the Arunachal professing their own tribal religion known as 'Donyi-poloism' (Donyi - Sun, Polo - moon).

It is a most tedious yet adventurous task to get to Ziro. It is surely not a walk in the park. At the outset one is faced with an archaic British rule where one has to procure an 'Inner Line Permit' to enter Arunachal Pradesh. This rule was introduced by the British to restrict the entry of British subjects without permission to the tribal land. Even after gaining freedom this rule is practiced in Free India, which is quite disconcerting. Luckily, the Arunachal Pradesh Government has streamlined the process by issuing the permit online.

Before one can even heave a sigh of relief, one is faced with the arduous task of actually traveling to Ziro. A distance of nearly 3000 kilometers, it takes about 4 days to complete it without a break. At the most, one can beat it by a day if flying to Guwahati fits the bill. After reaching Guwahati, one needs to go to Lakhimpur which is at

the border of Assam and Arunachal and from there, one has to board a Sumo to reach Ziro. Early chronicles by Shihabuddin Bayazid Shah detail the grueling terrain one has to experience to reach Ziro. He quotes, "it is another world, another people and other customs. Its roads are frightful like paths leading to the nook of death, fatal to life is its expanse like the unpeopled city of Destruction." Thankfully, as of now, due to the improvements it might not be so dangerous as is chronicled but one still has to hold one's breath while driving through the hilly terrain bordered with deathly hollows seaming the steep valley. Heart beats for the commendable dexterity of the drivers who drive through these valleys in a Sumo, filled with nearly 12 passengers and their luggage which at times might include baskets of chicken, as if they were born with these skills.

Once the fear is set aside, traveling through this rocky terrain is a mystical experience to say the least. As one leaves the plains of Assam and enters the hilly terrain of Arunachal, the landscape chang-

es and so does the weather. Dense forests embody the natural surroundings. Fog is an indispensable element of this place, irrespective of the season, dropping the visibility nearly to zero in winters. Hats off to the drivers again. After almost 6-7 hours of driving, we finally reach a small town before Ziro, Hapoli. Approximately 10 kms ahead is Old Ziro consisting of 7 small villages known as Bastis of the Apatani people and the view is mesmerising. Apatanis are agriculturists by profession and have been praised for their unique method of rice cultivation. Ziro is the kingdom of rice fields! These rice fields are cultivated in their own traditional way, without using animals or modern machinery and yet deliver a very good yield which suffices their own and the neighboring tribes. Their rice fields are irrigated through small canals or channels. The most unique feature of these rice fields is that it not just grows rice but also rears fish.

Yes, the Apatani practice is known as paddy-cum-fish culture and along with that they also grow millet on the elevated partition bunds between the rice plots. (So from their rice fields they get a full rice plate!) Every Apatani house has a small kitchen garden where they grow vegetables with the help of the water and waste materials from the kitchen. Utilization of available resources is what the Apatanis

teach us and this can be practiced by the so-called modern and educated people. With the breathtaking landscape and simple living of the Apatani tribe, this quaint town offers its visitors a view to a harmonious synergy of man and nature. One has to experience the hospitality and living of this simple tribe to really understand the diversity on this planet.

Not only the protagonist Rama but his ardent devotee, prove to be a good leader. Hanuman was in charge of the search for Sita. He searched entire Lanka several times but in vain. But deep within his heart, he was strongly determined to meet her and only then return back to his Lord. .And he did it! He found Sita, gave her Rama's message, went back to Rama to convey Sita's message in return. Everyone in the monkey's army along with Rama & Lakshmana appreciated Hanuman's accomplishment.
