



#### **Observations and Report on Feedback:**



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A total of 44 Alumni of the department submitted their feedback through online form. Their feedback on the current syllabus is satisfactory and most of the responses had positive tone in relation to the conceptual skills in it. Many alumni recommended inclusion of contemporary literary works in the curricula. An alumnus recommended that more skill-based topics like writing for media, content creation and problem solving. Some of them also recommended inclusion of topics that cater to writing practices needed in the current employment industry. For example - copywriting, proposal writing and professional communication skills. A common factor in the responses was regarding the paper of Gender and Literature that could be upgraded with more inclusive topics related with LGBTQIA+ issues. Social Justice and Social issues are the key terms used in many of the responses. Overall, the Alumni feedback substantially satisfactory and positive.




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#### **Observations and Report on Feedback:**

A total of 4 Academic peers of the department submitted their feedback through online form. Majority of the peers agreed to the view that the courses have been formulated such that competencies (as per cognitive levels) are well balanced and progressive with level of study. Two of the respondents agree that the syllabus includes all fundamental, contemporary and futuristic areas of study in theory and laboratory work. All the respondents agree to the proposition that the syllabus has areas for experiential learning (projects, on-the-job training, field work). One of the respondents suggest content defined in the Courses has scope for updating to include contemporary and issues of recent relevance. Two respondents suggested that topics included in the syllabus have areas of study relevant to major problems found in society and economy and



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how to overcome them. Whereas three respondents agree that the syllabus can motivate student engagement and can build student self-efficacy by transparently communicating how to succeed, one of them suggests that only 'advanced' learners will be able to succeed in completing the Courses. Overall, the academic peers' feedback is suggestive of positive remarks on the structure of the syllabus.
